Chronological vs. non-chronological

- **Chronological** – following the order in which they occurred.
- **Non chronological** – something that is not in time order.

What is a non-chronological report?

A non-chronological report is a text which isn't written in time order. They are normally non-fiction texts which give information on a particular subject or event, without referring to the order in which things happen.

What is a non-chronological report?

Things like instructions are written in **chronological** order (in time order).

An example of a **non-chronological** report would be a fact file about a certain topic, place or things. For example: a fact file about different safari animals do not have anything that is written in time order

What is a non-chronological report?

Generally, **non-chronological** reports should cover a single topic or theme. Any report which mixes different topics can easily become confused and incoherent.

Why do we need a non-chronological report?

- The purpose of a non-chronological report is to describe something factual, the way things are, tells you what something is or was

What are the key features of a non-chronological report?

- **A topic Title** – covers the whole subject
- A brief **introduction paragraph** which gives a who/what/where overview
- **Paragraphs** that include **sub-headings** for the information
- Written in **past tense**
- Written in **Third-person**
- Use of a **Formal tone**

All About Beaches

What Is a Beach?

Beaches are always found next to a stretch of water, such as the sea or a lake. Usually, they are composed of rock which could be in the form of sand, pebbles, gravel or shingle.

At some beaches, there is a high and low tide. This means that at certain points of the day, the sea comes further up the beach. On some beaches, at times, the sea completely covers it.

Beach Activities

Beaches are a popular choice for both a holiday or a day trip. As you can spend a full day there, many people choose to take a picnic. Other activities include building sandcastles of all shapes and sizes as well as playing a variety of ball games. People also choose to paddle at the seashore although it can be rather chilly. Those who are feeling brave may opt to go swimming! At some beaches, you can also find rock pools. There are lots of treasures to be found, including starfish and crabs.

1. If you are an art lover, come and explore some of the numerous museums and galleries of art in London.

London's great cathedral to international modern art is Tate Modern in which you'll find temporary exhibitions by top artists from Damien Hirst to Gauguin. Within Tate Britain you'll enjoy J.M.W. Turner's works and find much to gaze in awe. Enjoy for free great works by great masters such as Van Gogh, da Vinci, Cézanne or Constable...



2. To save money and take advantage of London without spending a penny, you could choose from these free attractions:

- ✓ watch the Changing of the guard ceremony outside Buckingham Palace to catch the ultimate royal experience, stand outside the Palace at 11 am.

- ✓ Take part in the 700 year old tradition of the **Ceremony of the Keys** at the Tower of London. Although tickets are free, you'll need to book them up to two months in advance.



3. How about experiencing breathtaking views of the capital City from the London Eye?

The Millennium Wheel standing at a height of 135 meters is the largest in Europe and has become the most popular attraction in the UK. On a clear day you can see around 40km from the top as far as Windsor Castle on a clear day. Open daily from 10 am. to 9 pm during the summer. Admission varies from £7.75 for children to £15.50 for adults. Advance booking is advised.

4. Fancy journeying through time?

London offers lots of historic Royal Houses to visit such as the Tower of London whose construction started in the 11th century, Kensington Palace which was Lady Diana's official residence or Henry VIII's Hampton Court Palace. 5. Why not make the most of London's numerous Parks and gardens?



London has 8 Royal Parks, botanical gardens and nature reserves. Among these are **Regent's Park**, a Londoner's favourite which has been a location in many films such as *Bridget Jones* or site for picnic.



6. Why not pop into some of London icons?

Westminster Abbey is the most enduringly stunning of London's churches and is the burial place of 17 monarchs and numerous statesmen, scientists, musicians and poets and has been the setting of every coronation since 1066. Admission prices vary from £6 to £15 depending on age and concession.

Saint Paul's Cathedral is officially the spiritual home of Great Britain. The funerals of Lord Nelson, the Duke of Wellington and Sir Winston Churchill were conducted there. It is one of the 89 churches rebuilt after the 1666 Great Fire which devastated London and it is also considered the gem of the City. Open from Monday to Saturday from 8.30 am to 4 pm. Guided tours at 11am, 11.30am, 1.30pm and 2pm. Admission is between £4.50 and £12.50.

A few tips:

- **Beware** of pick pocket wherever you go in London, either inside the shops, tube, bus, walking.
- **Be alert** of your own belongings and always aware of the surroundings.
- **Beware** of illegal taxis in London. Always take the Licensed London taxis or black cabs especially at night



Interesting facts

Cornwall has the longest coastline in Great Britain, measuring at 433 miles. It also has over 300 beaches and Truro is the only city in Cornwall. At the beaches in Cornwall, some of the waves can reach over 25ft – that's higher than a house! The famous Cornish pasty is the county's national dish and one of the largest ever made was in 2010, weighing 860 kg and measuring 4.5 metres across.
