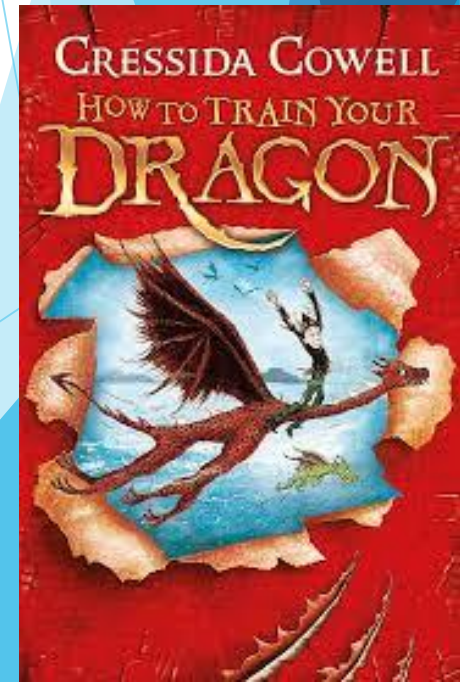
Tuesday 19th January

- ▶ Write a short summary of the chapter in your book.

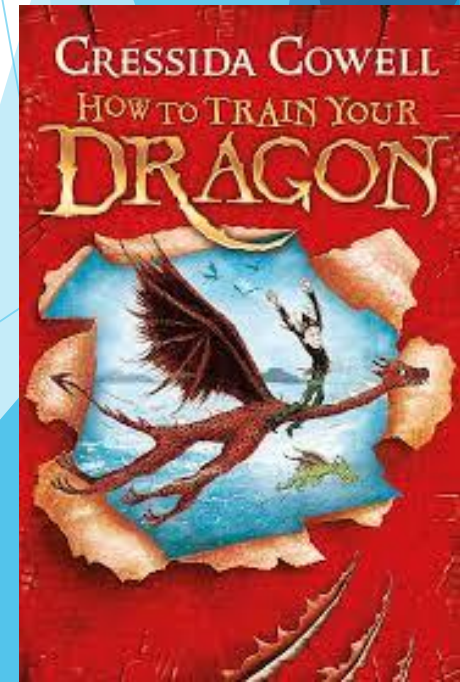


Wednesday 20th January

- ▶ 6. modestly

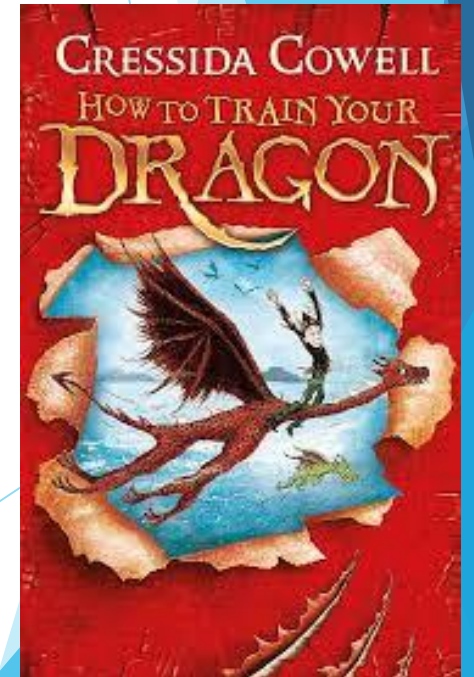
- ▶ Challenge: Can you write a sentence using each of these words?

Answers

Q1. Which phrase tells us how wet the boys already were?

The phrase that tells us how wet the boys already were is ‘soaked to the skin with sea-water’.

Q2. Which direction was the rain going in?

The rain was going horizontally.

Q3. Which word tells us what the winds sound like?

The word that tells us what the winds sound like is ‘shrieking’.

Q4. Which two words describe the Isle of Berk?

The two words that describe the Isle of Berk are salty and wastelands.

Q5. Write a sentence in your own words to describe the weather.

Any sentence in your own words which explains that it was very windy and rainy is correct.
