App of the week (KS1 & 2): **Flashnote Derby**



Flashnote Derby is a fun way for kids to learn and practise reading music notes.

Participate in each race where you identify different notes in order to urge your horse on towards the finish line. Answering quickly and accurately will cause your horse to gain ground whilst an incorrect answer will result in you falling behind. At the end of each race you can review to see how accurate your responses were and see the correct answers of those you missed.

This app teaches all elements of the treble, bass, alto or tenor clef making this a really versatile learning tool. Sharps and flats can be added to increase the challenge for more advanced students. Different levels are available too depending on ability and knowledge known. It's a fun learning tool to help increase and practise musical notation skills.



App of the week (KS3,4 & 5): **Drum pads 24 - Music Maker**



A perfect Sampler for every beat maker!

With 4.4 * rating - this has great sound quality and brilliant samples. No ads and it is said to be very responsive.

Challenge Can pupils create a modern composition - then perhaps see if they can sample a classical piece and create their own variation!
