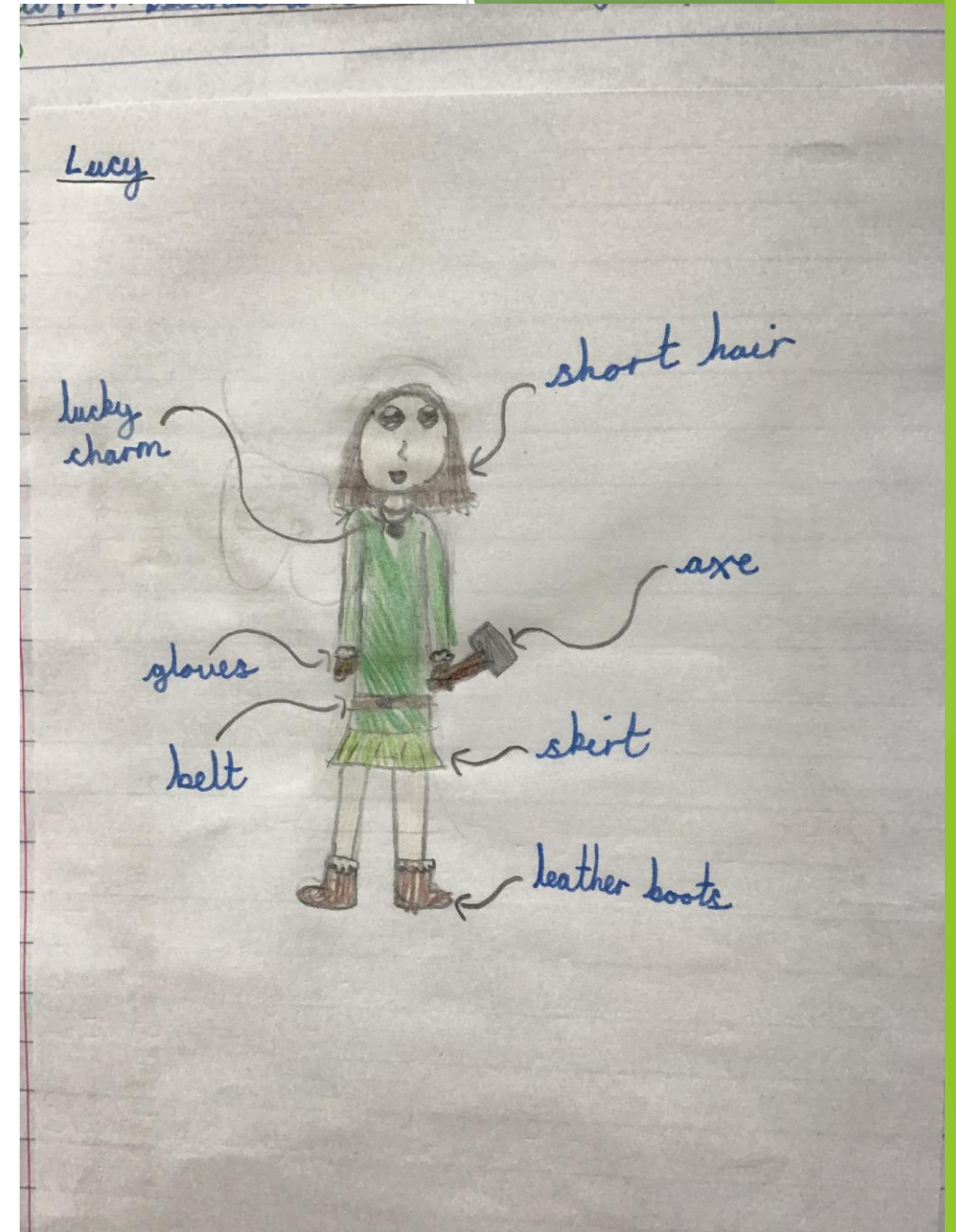
WALT: Describe a character through appearance and personality

How to Make a sword instructions

- ▶ Today we are going to create our own Viking character which we will use in our own Viking story next week
- ▶ We will use the FAB character description (Feelings, Appearance and Behaviour)
- ▶ You need to think of what your character looks like, what they are wearing and how that tells us about the character

Character Appearance

First you need to draw a picture of your Viking and label the features, you can name it as well. Don't forget to include any weapons or defence like a shield, sword or helmet your Viking is wearing.



Character Feelings

Think about the character you are creating for your story, what type of person are they?
What are their feelings? Try to use more complex feelings and not happy/sad etc. You might use a thesaurus (or go to <https://www.thesaurus.com/>) to help you.

Write a sub-heading Feelings and underline it beneath your picture of your Viking. You can then list the feelings of your character.



Character Behaviour

How does your Viking character behave and what do they do? How can their behaviour show how they are feeling? (eg. Walk around dragging their feet with head low or skip along whistling or stomp loudly shouting at everyone).

You can use their behaviour to show if they are friendly, strong, grumpy, brace etc.

Underneath your Feelings section, miss a line and write a subheading Behaviour and underline it, then list in detail the behaviour of your character thinking about what this shows the reader about your character.

Tomorrow we will be learning some new sentence types for stories and applying them to our character in our own story so you may want to start thinking about your Viking character and what adventures they are going to go on in your story.
